St Davids City Council serves a population of 1,751 residents across 46.4 square kilometres in Pembrokeshire. The Council's jurisdiction includes the urban core of St Davids and surrounding hamlets, much of which falls within the Pembrokeshire Coast National Park and overlaps with internationally important sites including the St Davids Peninsula Coast Special Area of Conservation (SAC) and Ramsey Island.

How the Council supports biodiversity:

- Direct land management (Memorial Playing Field, Waunfawr Playing Field, Whitesands Car Park)
- Asset ownership (City Hall, Cross Square)
- Grant funding and donations in support of local environmental organisations
- Community leadership and partnership working
- Consultative planning responses

Financial context: The Council income is generated through Whitesands Car Park operations, and on a precept that increased from £0 (2023/24) to £60,000 (2025/26), reflecting non-domestic council tax increases.

Legislative framework: The Council operates under the Environment (Wales) Act 2016 and the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dramatic increase in Non-Domestic Rates (from £12,000 to £33,000) diverting funds from direct biodiversity work • Regulatory complexity in obtaining permissions for sustainable innovations (e.g. solar panels, community art) • Reliance on volunteer capacity for technical projects requiring sustained engagement • Rising energy and operational costs constraining budgets for "additional" environmental projects 		
What will you change?		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pursue renewable energy implementation (solar panels on City Hall) to reduce carbon footprint and operational costs • Strengthen integration of biodiversity considerations in all financial planning decisions • Seek additional grant funding to supplement precept-based income • Continue building capacity through partnerships to overcome resource limitations • Enhance monitoring and data collection to better demonstrate impact 		
How and when will the Section 6 duty be monitored and the plan reviewed?		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Annual review: The Biodiversity Policy, once adopted will be reviewed annually as part of the Council's standard policy audit cycle • Three-yearly reporting: The next statutory Section 6 report will be published by December 2028 • Ongoing monitoring: Partnership activities and project outcomes reviewed through quarterly committee meetings • Community feedback: Regular updates via newsletters and website with opportunities for public input
